Evan Bravos has taught applied voice at Carthage for two years. Evan regularly sings with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra Chorus, the Lyric Opera's Opera in the Neighborhood Program, and the St. James Cathedral Choir. Favorite roles include Tom Joad (*The Grapes of Wrath*), Sid (*Albert Herring*), Dr. Falke (*Die Fledermaus*), and Maximilian/Martin (*Candide*). Evan has sung with the Aspen Festival, Central

City Opera, and at the Kennedy Center, as well as the Lake Geneva, Fox Valley, and Elgin Symphonies, the Elgin Youth Symphony, and the Chicago Bach Ensemble.

Peg Cleveland has taught applied voice at Carthage for three years. An early debut as Papagena in a concert version of Die Zauberflote with The Cleveland Orchestra led to several soprano soloist engagements with orchestras such as the Interlochen Philharmonic, Chicago's famed Quintet Attacca and the Pacific Northwest Symphony Orchestra, to name a few. Peg toured in South Pacific with Robert Goulet, and recently performed in New York's Birdland Jazz Club with the cabaret team Goldrich and Heissler.

Klaus Georg has performed as a soloist in such contrasting works as Chicago A Cappellas Wade in the Water, Mason Bates' Sirens with CSO MusicNOW, Mozart's Requiem at the Music Institute of Chicago, Stravinsky's Les Noces with the NIU New Music Festival, and Saint-Saen's Oratorio de Noel and Haydn's Theresienmesse with the Downers Grove Choral Society. Klaus also sings with the Chicago Symphony Chorus, the Lyric Opera of Chicago, the Grant Park Music Festival, and the Soli Deo Gloria's Chicago Bach Project.

Fumi Nishikiori-Nakayama teaches piano at Carthage College and is one of the staff accompanists. Fumi's love for vocal music and theater lead her to remain as one of the opera coaches for Indiana University Opera Theater for six years. She is a Juilliard School Dalcroze Institute certified instructor of Dalcroze Eurhythmics and often gives demonstrations and lectures to music teachers and students in the mid-west. She frequently performs as a member of Cecilia Trio, and also collaborates with greater Milwaukee and Chicago area artists.

Corinne Ness is the Carthage music department chair, where she teaches applied voice and leads the music theatre program. Favorite regional performances include Stravinsky's Les Noces with the NIU New Music Festival, Beethoven's Mass In D with the Music Institute of Chicago, and Vivaldi's Gloria with the Kenosha Symphony Orchestra. Corinne originated the role of Mother Jones and covered the lead role of Annie in Pine Mountain Music Festival's commissioned opera, Children of the Keewenaw. Corinne regularly performs gems from the American Songbook with her husband, jazz guitarist David Ness.
