

Fourragere is a medal blue background w/red, white, blue stripes and a star with picture of an Indian Chief in center, the word Chicago on one point, and "June 3,4,5 1926 on another of the points. Moving down to the middle of the shelf at the left is a Marine insignia of a globe and an anchor showing the Western Hemisphere. All Marines wore this. Next to that is another "Sharp Shooter" identical to the first one on the top shelf. Ribbon is red with gray stripe down the middle.

Next to that medal is a "two arm bar" patch (if Jim recalls from ROTC) this signifies a Corporal so perhaps he was promoted at some point.

MIDDLE TOP SHELF

In the middle of the top shelf on the left is a "Sharp Shooter" medal; the ribbon is red with gray stripe down the middle. Next to that is another "Sharp Shooter" only this one the ribbon is red with blue stripe down middle and overall, it is a little larger. Who knows the significance between the two?

Next is an interesting one with Warrior with a sword on a horse and two dates of 1914 and 1918. On the back there is Latin "George IV V Britt Omn Rex Et Ind Imp"

At far right is a black and white photo of Cy taken May 10, 1918 dressed in full field pack and helmet. The background is a port (possibly Brest) somewhere.....so possibly as he was leaving to return from France or arriving back in the US. (He marched in a homecoming parade in NYC with only four of his comrades that came back.)

BOTTOM SHELF AT LEFT:

On the top shelf at the left is a posed photo of Cy in uniform but casual and what Jim believes would be his Private 1st Class Single Bar.

Also 3 Ribbons

Blue with red, white, black stripes

Green with red, white, chocolate brown and black stripes

Red with white stripes. (Wonder what these are for??? rab)
